CONTROLLING GOOGLE

Google needs to be "controlled" and checks made on the information it retains.

Maintaining your security when using Google services is essential to protect your personal information and privacy. With so much of our daily activity—emails, searches, and saved data—tied to Google accounts, it's important to regularly check and update your security settings. One key step is using strong, unique passwords and enabling twofactor authentication to prevent unauthorized access. Google's Security Checkup tool can help identify potential risks and guide you in fixing them. Clearing your browsing history is another good habit, especially on shared or public devices. It helps protect your personal searches, login data, and prevents websites from tracking your behaviour. Additionally, managing your Google account's activity controls allows you to decide what data is stored and for how long.

Regularly reviewing these settings not only enhances your digital safety but also gives you more control over your online footprint, keeping your information secure and private.

OCTOBER SUNDAY MEETING

PETER WHARTON'S ANTARCTIC ADVENTURE



In late 2013, Peter Wharton embarked on a 32-day voyage aboard the Bark Europa, a classic three-masted sailing ship first launched in 1911 and now serving as a sail-training vessel. The journey spanned more than 6,000 kilometres through the Southern Ocean—an unforgettable expedition of dramatic seas, dazzling wildlife, and Antarctic history.

After flying to the Falkland Islands, Peter joined 31 other voyagers from 15 nations to sail into the "Furious Fifties," where winds reached 55 knots and swells towered 10

metres. Crews worked in rotating four-hour watches, steering, keeping lookout for ice, and hauling the ship's 1,250 square metres of sail. Life aboard was lively but disciplined—everyone helped run the ship under the guidance of the permanent crew.

Their first major stop was South Georgia, a rugged island of glaciers and wildlife once central to Shackleton's heroic saga. Peter visited the whaling ruins at Grytviken, the explorer's grave, and enormous penguin and seal colonies at Salisbury Plain and St Andrews Bay—some exceeding a quarter of a million birds. Strict biosecurity



and environmental rules governed every landing, ensuring this pristine ecosystem remained undisturbed.

Continuing south, the Europa sailed through drifting icebergs towards the South Orkneys and the Antarctic Peninsula. Peter recalled the awe of sailing through vast ice fields under bright blue skies, the silence broken only by wind and creaking ice. Encounters with albatrosses, whales, and penguins of every kind made the experience deeply personal and humbling.

Temperatures hovered near freezing, yet camaraderie and hearty meals kept spirits high.

The voyage ended by rounding Cape Horn and returning through the legendary Drake Passage—one of the world's roughest seas. For Peter, it was "one of the great adventures of my lifetime," combining beauty, hardship, and teamwork. The mix of shared labour, wildlife encounters, and







historical insight left him with immense respect for Antarctica's grandeur and the enduring warmth of life aboard the Bark Europa.

Becoming Scam Savvy

We were fortunate to have a visit from **Rachel Rabarts from the BNZ** at our October Sunday Meeting at which time Rachel discussed the various traps we can so easily fall into with regard the internet unless we are vigilant.

Rachel provided an excellent brochure for those who attended so if you did not get one it is worth popping into the BNZ – or in fact probably any bank to pick up their guidelines in dealing with the possibility of online fraud. Just to highlight the prevalence of scams she said they get 3 or 4 customers a day coming into her branch for help due to scams.

Everybody is a target

Anyone can be the victim of a scam - scammers are increasingly sophisticated and manipulative. Scammers count on your being busy and target us when our attention is pulled in multiple directions.

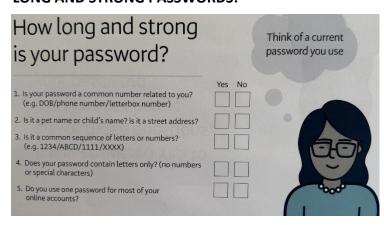
Education is the best tool they can arm people with to reduce harm to us. We all know a long-lost uncle has not left us millions, we haven't won US\$10 million in a lottery and while you are no doubt lovable just be wary of someone loving you online.

Scams come in all shapes and sizes and beware of the "link" sent with a fake invoice or offer. Don't share personal information, is it too good to be true, have you been asked to act quickly to get a benefit and so on.

PAUSE, THINK - before you Act. If it looks too good to be true it probably is and trust your instincts.

There is a lot of regular advice from banks such as thy will never call to ask you for remote access – they have all that information anyway. If you think you have been violated, contact your bank immediately or call the police on 105 or online at 105.police.govt.nz. Do report the scam by phoning CERT NZ on 0800 237869 or online at cert.govt.nz

LONG AND STRONG PASSWORDS:



- 1. Is your password a common number related to you?
- 2. Is it a pet name or child's name or is it a street address?
- 3. Is it a common sequence of letters or numbers? (eg 1234/ABCD?1111/XXXX)
- 4. Does your password contain letters only (no numbers or special characters
- 5. Do you use one password for most of your online accounts?





If you have said yes to any of the above – time to change. Once a scammer has access to your password it gives them many options like stealing your money, accessing personal information, posing as you to trick your family and friends.

Making Long and Strong Passwords:

- Take some time to create some long and strong passwords.
- You can check how strong your password is by visiting www.security.org/how-secure-is-my-password.

Tip: Sentences are best because they are easier to remember! Examples from the bank:

Password	Time to Crack
Qwerty123	Instantly
Sheba01	1 minute
I love my cat	100 thousand years
I.H%kiguefjn0)9e	41 trillion years
I love gummy bears!	4 quintillion years

(From your Editors – don't use the last 3 above either as the entire customer base of the BNZ now has access to these suggestions. ②.)

Another option is a Password Manager but that is probably worthy of another story. As is the use of Multi-Factor Authentication.

Final Comment: Use a different password for every online account, especially online banking and social media (i.e. Facebook, Twitter etc) and email.



START OR STOP SAVING PASSWORDS

By default, Chrome offers to save your password. You can turn this option off or on at any time.

- 1. On your computer, open Chrome.
- 2. At the top right, select Profile Passwords .
 - If you can't find the Passwords icon, at the top right, select More : > Passwords and autofill > Google Password Manager.
- 3. On the left, select Settings.
- 4. Turn Offer to save passwords and passkeys on or off.

Show, edit, delete, or export saved passwords

- 1. On your computer, open Chrome.
- 2. At the top right, select Profile Passwords .
 - If there's no Passwords icon, at the top right, select More
 Passwords and autofill
 Google Password Manager.

Delete all Google Password Manager data

You can delete your Google Password Manager data, which include passwords and passkeys from Google Password Manager settings.

- 1. On your computer, open Chrome.
- 2. At the top right, select More Passwords and Autofill Google Password Manager.
- 3. On the left, select Settings.



4. On the right of "Delete all Google Password Manager data," select **Delete data** > **Delete**.

Tip: To delete other browsing data, <u>learn how to delete browsing data in Chrome</u>.

Check for compromised passwords

You can check all your saved passwords at once to find out if they're exposed in a data breach or potentially weak and easy to guess.

To check your saved passwords:

- 1. On your computer, open Chrome.
- 2. At the top right, select Profile Passwords .
 - If you can't find the Passwords icon, at the top right, select More > Passwords and autofill > Google Password Manager.
- 3. On the left, select Checkup 🔽.

You'll get details on any password exposed in a data breach and any weak, easy to guess passwords.







NOVEMBER SUNDAY MEETING

PROFESSOR PAUL SPOONLEY

Immigration and Immigrants: Opportunities and Challenges

Paul has been writing and researching on immigrants for many decades. Earlier this year, he was an invited guest of the Max Planck Institute to consider where immigration trends are heading, including the growing need for many ageing countries to attract migrants while there are political groups who oppose immigration and immigrants. New Zealand is one the exceptions to these political developments (as are Canada and Australia) — although there are exceptions. Paul will talk about the latest insights on immigration trends and impacts.

Distinguished Professor Paul Spoonley was previously Pro Vice-Chancellor of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences at Massey University. Once he stepped down, he was appointed to advise the Police Commissioner (2022-25) as well as Co-Director of He Whenua Taurikura. the National Centre for Countering Violent Extremism (2022-23).

Paul is a Fellow of the Auckland Museum and a Board member and a Visiting Research Fellow at the Max Planck Institute for the Study of Religious and Ethnic Diversity, Germany. He was awarded the Science and Technology Medal by the Royal Society in 2009 for cross-cultural understanding and he was a Fulbright Senior Scholar at the University of California Berkeley.

In 2025, he was made an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit.

He is the author or editor of 29 books, including the biography of Ranginui Walker, The "New" New Zealand. Facing Demographic Disruption (2021) and Histories of Hate. The Radical Right in Aotearoa New Zealand (2022).

MATT ELLIOTT

Billy T James

Author Matt Elliott will take us back to the 1980s, reminiscing about our most popular entertainer of the decade, comedian Billy T James. Giggles aplenty!

He was educated at Mt. Carmel primary school, Meadowbank, and then St. Peter's College, Auckland. Alongside a brief, incomplete stint at university he pursued a career as a stand-up comedian beginning on the embryonic local scene in 1989. He moved to Melbourne in 1993 working the pro-circuit there – the first Kiwi comedian to do so – in the company of some great comedians, famous and non. Returning home 18 months later and taking part in the first ever Auckland Comedy Festival in 1993, he continued performing around the country but with one eye on more serious writing.



His history of New Zealand comedy followed along with writing film reviews for the marvellous but sadly shortlived Quote/Unquote magazine. In 1996 National Radio produced his children's story Young Horace and Oscar's Trick. Read by Ian Watkin, it continued to be broadcast for 20 years.

After a couple of years living in Ireland, he formulated and taught a Comedy Writing course in Christchurch which morphed into The Ministry of Chocolate Fisheries radio shows. Through the early 2000s he was based in Wellington performing in local venues and appearing in Fringe and Comedy festivals. For two years he had a weekly comedy show on Access Radio which made use of his large comedy album collection as well as interviewing visiting comedians and promoting local comedy. This also gave him the opportunity to write and produce several hour-long documentaries on the likes of Lenny Bruce and American Civil Rights comedy.

You can see this in several scenes of Peter Jackson's King Kong (if you know where to look, freeze-frame and enlarge the bystanders) and he has appeared in TV shows such as New Zealand's Top 100 History Makers, History Under the Hammer, Funny As and documentaries produced overseas on the life of Dave Gallaher. Being made redundant during the GFC from a position as a legal researcher at a large New Zealand law firm, he took the leap into becoming a full-time author.

SEPTEMBER VISIT TO THE AUCKLAND LIBRARY BOOK SORTING CENTRE

Our September outing on 24th September was to the Auckland Library Book Sorting Centre in Ōtāhuhu and we were a group of 4.

Auckland Council has 56 libraries around the region plus a number of small branches and books obtained from one library can be returned to another. Books not available at a library but part of the sock can be ordered and the borrower will be notified once it has arrived.

On return back to the library, books are scanned and divided into two lots, either going back on the shelf or to be re-directed to another library. All re-directions go to the book sorting centre and in August this year 580,000 books arrived there.

In the sorting centre, each book is scanned (we were given the opportunity to do the scanning) and while travelling along a conveyor, the system directs each book down the chute of the library where it has to go to. It could be to the branch where the lending took place or to the library that currently does not hold a copy on its shelf. Additionally books to the receiving library are sorted whether to be 'shelved' or kept on 'hold'.

In summary it was informative to see a sophisticated system operating in the background and unbeknown of the library visitor.

After the visit we went back to the North Shore and had refreshments at the Coffee Lab in Silverfield.
