NOVEMBER SUNDAY MEETING

IMMIGRATION AND THE FUTURE OF NEW ZEALAND

Professor Paul Spoonley, a leading New Zealand demographer and immigration expert, recently addressed our club on the complex mix of challenges and opportunities presented by immigration.



Drawing on his international work—including with the Max Planck Institute in Germany—he explained that population change, rather than political ideology, is now the driving force behind immigration policy worldwide.

New Zealand, like many developed nations, is facing a sharp decline in birth rates and an ageing population. The fertility rate has fallen to around 1.5 births per woman, well below the replacement level of 2.1. Within two decades, nearly a quarter of New Zealanders will be aged 65 or older. Without immigration, our population would begin to shrink, and our workforce would struggle to meet demand. Business NZ projects a shortage of 250,000 workers by the 2030s.

Immigration is therefore vital to maintaining our economy and essential services. Skilled migrants—especially from India, China, and the Philippines—now underpin key sectors such as healthcare, aged care, and information technology. Yet, as Paul warned, New Zealand

also faces a "brain exchange": while we welcome skilled newcomers, many of our own graduates leave for higher pay and opportunities in Australia and elsewhere.


He emphasised that integration has largely been positive. Migrant families tend to value education highly, and their New Zealand-born children often excel academically. However, Paul also believes the country lacks a coherent **population and social-cohesion policy**. Unlike Canada, which funds language and settlement support, New Zealand offers little formal assistance to help newcomers adapt to local culture and idioms—things as simple as "bring a plate."


Globally, Paul noted, anti-immigrant politics are rising even as nations depend more on migrant labour. He urged New Zealand to maintain its tradition of openness while managing migration at a sustainable pace. Immigration, he concluded, is not just an economic necessity but a social opportunity—one that will shape the character and success of New Zealand in the decades ahead.



NOVEMBER VISIT TO DATACOM CENTRE

When approaching Datacom regarding a visit to their data centre in Albany, they responded: 'We are truly excited to welcome you and your members to our facility'.

The company was founded in 1965, has 5,300 employees at 26 locations in New Zealand and Australia and operates four date centres in New Zealand and two in Australia.



Due to a number of health and safety requirements on the part of Datacom our group only numbered 5 members. The centre is a high security facility and it was an experience to go through the various steps. A list of those attending was submitted days before the visit and we were issued with an access code. Arriving at the gate, we gave our credentials via intercom and the first gate opened allowing us to drive in up to the second gate. That opened only after the first gate had closed to prevent tail gating. The security officer checked each of us against a photo ID, we were photographed and were given a visitor label bearing our name and photo and then our guide took

over. No photography was permitted except for one place and confidentiality revolved primarily around client names.

The heart of the data centre are the racks of servers holding all the clients' data and to ensure an absolute continuous operation, a massive support system is in place. Powerful transformers reduce the incoming high voltage to regular mains voltage and feed it into uninterrupted power supply units. They smooth out power fluctuations and switch instantly to battery supply when mains power has been lost. Pre-warmed backup power generators are ready to take over within 20 seconds of a power failure and fuel levels and fuel contamination is regularly checked. Cooling is primarily with



outdoor air, which is pumped into the space below the servers, cycling through the server room and rising as warm air into a large space above. There it is mixed with fresh outdoor air and a new cycle commences. Air is only occasionally cooled mechanically. Being environmentally responsible and a 'good neighbour' is another key objective and figures are reported monthly to clients. There are backups and control systems for every function to safeguard a continuous operation and a visit to the control room ended our formal tour to be followed by refreshments.

While there is considerable secrecy about power hungry data centres being built here, we were given a comprehensive tour of Datacom with many detailed explanations and our guide was in no hurry to send us on our way. For us it was a most informative visit.

Multi Commander


Microsoft Windows Explorer is great for general file management tasks. However, there are several more complicated tasks that Windows Explorer cannot handle. **Multi Commander** can accomplish these advanced tasks. It's a free file manager that lets you manage your files and perform many tasks not possible through Windows Explorer. In the picture below, is an example of the Multi Commander interface. As shown, the interface is similar to Windows Explorer with additional features such as multiple panes, tabs, and buttons.

Features of Multi Commander

- Compare the right and left file explorers and show what's different.
- Built using Extension/Plug-in architecture that allows almost any imaginable feature to be added.
- Easily filter and copy or move only the files specified in the filter.
- Excellent keyboard support for anyone who enjoys keyboard shortcuts or working without using a mouse.
- Convert files between Unix (LF), Windows (CRLF), and Mac (CR) format.
- Browse and read files within a RAR (Roshal ARchive) without extracting the files.
- Quickly change a file or folder name to all lowercase, all uppercase, or Camel case.
- Browse, update, and modify the system Registry.
- Create and verify the MD5 and SFV (CRC32) Checksum of files using the MC-Checksum extension.
- Tab support to have multiple folders open at once.
- Script engine support to create scripts to automate tasks.
- FTP (File Transfer Protocol) support.
- Save and load a selection of files and folders to memory or a file.
